UUA TRUSTEE TIDBITS*Joan Lund, September, 2010*

Routinely this is the time of year when congregations are welcoming the “new year”, members and friends returning, and guests in our midst. It has been a relaxing summer for me...hopefully for you, also. As I write this, a few weeks before publication, I am awaiting the birth of my first grandson; happily, I am already the grandmother of four granddaughters.

At General Assembly in June the delegates passed a Statement of Conscience (SOC): **Creating Peace**. I wrote about it briefly in a report to the District following GA (on the District web page: www.floridadistrict.org), and hope in your community you are/will be involved in this SOC.

Historically and today morally our faith calls us to create peace through the work of peace building, peacemaking, and peacekeeping, by addressing the roots of conflict. This includes negotiation of fair and sustainable peace agreements, mediation between disagreeing parties, and post-conflict reconciliation. UUs advocate the culture of peace through change in public policies, religious consciousness, and individual lifestyles. Our faith believes that initial response to conflict should be in a non-violent manner yet we acknowledge the right to defend ourselves and stand with others who are countering aggression. We know true peace requires the cooperation of all nations and peoples and that the creation of peace is accomplished in different ways. We continue to affirm a range of individual choices, including military service and conscientious objection. Even though our religious tradition calls us to create peace at times we have not had the courage to speak and act against violence and injustice. We have not acknowledged our own complicity in violence by not acting in constructive ways, by not speaking out to unjust power exerted by our own nation.

The Creating Peace SOC challenges, individuals, congregations, and our Association to engage with more persistence, creativity, and depth in the task of creating peace. Our theological principles are grounded in the fundamental unity and interdependence of all existence, the transforming power of love, the inherent worth and dignity of all persons, human freedom, cooperative power, justice, peace, humility, and open-mindedness.

I have condensed the full SOC, which can be found on www.uua.org. There are many ways each of us can be involved in creating peace within our congregations and communities. All of us are knowledgeable and creative so let's just do it! I look forward to hearing from you at jlund@uua.org or 818-931-9727. Happy September one and all.

WELCOMING CONGREGATION ADULT RE CLASSES PLANNED...to start in early/mid-September

Eric & Rachel Christensen will be leading an adult religious education program using the Welcoming Congregation curriculum. The series consists of 14 weekly sessions, **beginning early/mid September** and ending mid December. The workshops provide a safe environment to explore our thoughts and feelings and knowledge regarding sexual orientation and gender issues, to understand the experiences of bisexual, gay, lesbian and transgender (BGLT) people, and to explore ways for our congregation to become more welcoming. UU congregations all over the country have used this curriculum to grow in understanding and right relations.

The workshops build on each other, and depend on developing trust, confidence and deep relationship, so they ask that participants commit to the entire program of workshops. The workshops will be held on Mondays or Thursdays, based on the response from the participants. They will be held at the church, beginning at 7 pm, and will end by 9 pm. Our annual **Water Ceremony is Sunday, September 19th**. The water service is a UU ritual, usually conducted in the fall when friends and members return from their summer travels. They are invited to bring a sample of water from their travels or water that may have other significance for them. All of the samples are poured into a common vessel to signify coming together again. It's a way of symbolizing that many are one, and a way of getting reacquainted. The ritual is also a way of welcoming members of a congregation to a new church year. This September, as we prepare to officially dedicate our new building, the water ceremony will have a deeper meaning to each of us. Plan to join the fellowship for this special "celebration of connectedness."

Water is an intrinsic part of most spiritual beliefs. Its uses and symbolism in religion are many and varied; it's spiritual and healing properties are seen in rites and rituals; and its representations are as numerous as they are diverse. These different religious and cultural aspects of water reflect the vast array of civilizations that have made water the central element in their practices. In Christianity, baptism links the concept of the water of life with the water of purification.

In China, water is considered to be the source of all life and it is the specific den of the dragon.

A Message from Rev. Kenn Hurto, our Florida UUA District Executive

We are a "*Faith Beyond Belief*," notes UUA President Peter Morales.

I welcome this reminder that Unitarian Universalism -- although begun in theological dispute -- is much more than trying to craft a "right belief." Indeed, as I visit with congregational leaders, our leading cause of congregational heart-burn stems from some trying to enforce a creedal purity, even to the point of censoring what words we use to express our highest hopes and deepest aspirations.

Were I to wave the magic wand for our District congregations, it would be to put **an end to the word wars** that so often divide, even hurt our sense of beloved community. Not having such power, I call your attention to our origins: Our congregations were born in the mid-17th century ambition to be a community of inquiry, as noted in the *1629 Salem Covenant*: We bind ourselves together "to walk together in all God's ways, ... as he is pleased to reveal himself to us in his Blessed word of truth."

A less archaic version updates that ideal:

"We covenant with one another - and do bind ourselves together in the presence of this religious community to express our deepest and most cherished convictions, as they are borne by each person, to find a common vision for a better world, to seek the life of the spirit, as it is known by each person, choosing with reverence its name, and to walk together in the way of truth and love, as it is shown to us and to all people, in word and deed."

At our best, we Unitarian Universalists show respect for each other's worth and dignity by engaging in an on-going dialogue toward mutual spiritual growth. At our less than best, we sometimes try to clone one another spiritually.

As we move toward the annual fall up-charging of our ministries, I pray you will keep in mind we are one heart and one ambition -- to nurture the soul & heal the world -- amidst all our diversity of faith conviction and expression. Our faith is a way of life, far more than it is a way of belief. May we walk well together, my friends.

SOCIAL CONCERNS...NEWS FOR SEPTEMBER

One of the greatest social concerns right now is the unprecedented level of need in Pakistan. The U.N. says that more than 4 million Pakistanis are homeless from flooding. Because of their geographic conditions, high birthrate, and bad infrastructure, Pakistan and Bangladesh (formerly East Pakistan) are susceptible to massive floods that displace their population and curtails food production.
